90th Annual Installation & Awards Dinner Gala

"Re-Energize the Business Spirit!" was the theme of the night as Chamber members, local businesses, dignitaries, and guests gathered for an evening of awards, speeches, and live performances—an eventful night presented by the Rosemead Chamber of Commerce.

On Friday, July 14, The Chamber held its 90th Annual Installation & Awards Dinner Gala at the Double-Tree by Hilton Hotel Los Angeles in Rosemead. Mike Eng, former Assemblymember of the 49th District served as emcee of the event. The Installation Ceremony bid farewell to Robert Oehler as Chamber president and welcomed incoming president Paul Chen.

"As our business communities look forward to achieving ever greater success, the Chamber wishes to continue to invigorate the business spirit within our region to further benefit our members and friends in the community," said Paul Chen in a written statement included in the printed event program. "I am honored and pleased to continue the Chamber's tradition of service as its incoming president."

Chen said the Chamber will be able to mobilize more resources. Chen says that he welcomes feedback to help shape the direction of the Chamber and formulate a successful service model.

Mike Eng opened the event by welcoming guests and leading attendees in the Pledge of Allegiance. Rosemead Mayor Polly Low was first up in presenting a plaque to the Rosemead Chamber of Commerce.

"[The Chamber has] always been extremely supportive of our city. They have always been partners with us. We are so glad that they have put so much effort into the continuation of success and tonight it is a great success to see everyone here," said Mayor Low.

Councilmember Maggie Clark also thanked and congratulated the Chamber on their work. City Manager Bill Manis also made a few brief comments.

"It is a pleasure to have such a great Chamber of Commerce in our community," said Manis. "I work very closely—my team does—with Ray Jan and the Chamber Board. We have some great things happening with the Chamber and with the city."

Certificates from the offices of Congresswoman Judy Chu, Congressman Ed Royce, and State Controller Betty Yee were given to the Chamber and its outgoing and incoming presidents in recognition of their service to the community.

Mike Eng introduced outgoing Chamber president Robert Oehler to hand out this year's President's Award. Eng shared a few comments about Oehler during his introduction.

"Rob has been an amazing advocate for business—small business in particular," said Eng. "He was president of Pacific Alliance Bank and he continues his passion after retiring and joined the Chamber Board. Our out-going president saw the need to really replicate the membership, to replicate the programs, and to give Rosemead its proper due, and so he developed a comprehensive business plan. There are more people here tonight than I have seen before. This business plan has been adopted by the Board and it is going to be his legacy."

Oehler took the stage and presented the President's Award to C.A.L. Poultry Vikon. C.A.L. Poultry has and continues to work closely with the Chamber in community outreach efforts and with its own community engagement program. Every year, the company provides holiday food baskets to hungry families. In 2016, C.A.L. Poultry joined the Rosemead School Supply Drive lead by Councilmember Armenta as well as launched the Rosemead Toy Drive in conjunction with the Chamber.

Following the President's Award, a special presentation was made by Deputy Director Jaime Chen of the Taipei Economic and Cultural Office in Los Angeles.
