Dr. Deborah Kerr Leads El Monte-Rosemead Adult School Into New School Year

El Monte-Rosemead Adult School is part of the El Monte Union High School District. The school district was founded in 1901 and is rich with history. The EMRAS mission statement is “to empower our diverse student population to succeed in an ever-changing global society through a variety of educational services.” They strive for their students to be effective communicators, problem solvers, and lifelong learners.

Serving as principal for El-Monte Rosemead Adult School is Dr. Deborah Kerr. During her time as a teacher, she was recognized by the U.S. Secretary of Education in her development of a national model program for computer-assisted instruction. She has an extensive background in adult literacy including having held leadership roles at Pomona Adult School, Riverside Adult School, and Baldy View ROP. Dr. Kerr holds a BA from Muhlenberg College, a master’s degree in Educational Management, and a doctorate in Organizational Leadership from the University of La Verne.

Dr. Kerr has been an adult educator since 1981 and its been her life’s passion. She has just completed her fourth year with El Monte-Rosemead Adult School.

“El Monte-Rosemead Adult School has a really rich history. It goes back for many, many years with excellent programs and services,” Dr. Kerr said. “When that opportunity became open, and I realized that I might be able to be part of this great organization...that’s what brought me to El Monte-Rosemead Adult School.”

The Rosemead Report has an opportunity to speak with Dr. Kerr as El Monte-Rosemead Adult School recently kicked off the start of another school year.

Dr. Kerr explained that the programs offered by EMRAS fall into three categories. The first category includes programs geared towards immigrants. Those programs include English as a second language (ESL) and citizenship classes. These types of programs are

some of the school’s largest.

The second category of programs are for students who are seeking to complete a high school diploma or high school equivalency (GED). Those programs are also very popular at the school.

The third category of courses include a variety of career training programs. Classes offered in job training range from business and computer classes to medical training classes—such as medical assistant and nurse assistant, physical therapy aide, pharmacy technician, and vocational nursing.

Dr. Kerr noted that the school also offers a trades program.

“We have construction trades, electrician training—which is a state certified electrician program, we teach custodians how to be better custodians, and we have a machining program,” Dr. Kerr said.

Dr. Kerr explained that the only real restriction for students to enroll is for them to meet the age requirement. All students must be at least 18 years of age or older at the time of enrollment.

“Most of our programs are free—for ESL, high school diploma, and GED prep, those are all free,” Dr. Kerr said. “There is no fee at all and it is open for people to [enroll] at any time.”

Incoming students can expect to take an assessment test following registration. The results of the test will assist in the placement of the student in the appropriate class.

“There is no barrier and the assessment is not an entry test, it is more so to make sure that we give you the right classes,” said Dr. Kerr. “It’s the same thing with our [Career Technical Education] CTE and job training programs—we want to make sure that the students are ready to be successful in that job training.”

Fees for CTE programs vary, but in some cases they can be as little as \$25 for the entire program. Of the school’s most extensive programs is a year-long vocational nursing program. It is the highest priced program with a fee of \$4100 for the year.

“The cost, in comparison to many other training programs that provide the same kind of training...we are minimal cost in relation to some of the other programs out there,” said Dr. Kerr. “We believe our community has a need to be job-trained without a big cost and it’s so easy to get sucked into some of those private colleges that demand financial aid or to take out loans. We don’t do that to our students. We want our students to be able to get the training and go to work...it is our commitment.”

EMRAS is able to offer courses that provide training for new careers in a short period of time.

“I think the thing that is most fun for me is to be able to say ‘you can have a new career in less than a year.’ That’s really our goal—to help our students that want to get jobs to be trained for a new job and have it be in the short term—short term training,” Dr. Kerr said.

EMRAS is not isolated from other educational institutions. As Dr. Kerr explained, all adult schools in California are part of a consortium that’s connected to a community college. For EMRAS, that community college is Rio Hondo. The consortium includes five agencies: Rio Hondo College, Whittier Adult School, El Rancho Adult School, Tri-Cities ROP, and El Monte-Rosemead Adult School.

With EMRAS being connected to Rio Hondo College, some students may choose to transition into college and EMRAS can assist students who wish to do so.

“It really depends on what the student’s goals are,” Dr. Kerr said. “Many of our students—their goal is to go to work, so we train them and get them ready for work, but in some cases they may want a higher level of training to be able to move into a higher position once they are working. So, we do encourage our students—we actually have a Rio Hondo counselor on our campus two days per week that helps those students who want to transition to college make that transition. So, we’re **AWARDS, continue on page 3**

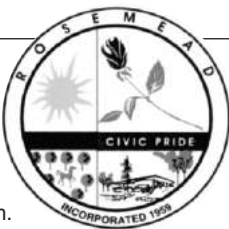

HELPING YOUTH SUCCEED IN SCHOOL, AT WORK, AND IN LIFE!

The Asian Youth Center (AYC) exists to empower low-income, immigrant, and at-risk youth, of all communities, and their families. AYC achieves this by providing culturally and linguistically competent education, employment, and social services to youth. AYC also has an Emergency Food program and engages in Community Outreach and Education to help families.

The Anniversary Celebration & Awards Dinner is an evening gala that honors AYC's partners and community leaders. The event features a plated Western-style dinner, both silent and live auctions, and celebrates the achievements of pioneers who are committed to helping youth and families. The gala consistently attracts over 500 attendees, including business and community leaders, elected officials and other professionals. All proceeds from the event will benefit AYC's youth programs.

FULL S.T.E.A.M. AHEAD!

STEAM stands for STEM (Science, Engineering, Technology, and Math) plus Art. As academics recognized that creativity and design thinking is necessary for innovation in STEM, there has been a strong shift from STEM to STEAM. AYC has always focused on Arts and STEM education for youth, so it only made sense for us to integrate both and go "Full STEAM Ahead!"

- \$150 sponsors online curriculum in Math and English for 3 students
- \$500 covers STEAM project kits for 20 students
- \$750 covers basic craft supplies for a year of weekly art projects
- \$1,500 covers a STEAM field trip with transportation and entrance fees
- \$2,500 sponsors a STEAM assembly and speaker
- \$5,000 sponsors 100 students to participate in AYC's STEAM Day

Between 2017 to 2027, STEM/STEAM jobs will grow 13%, compared to 9% in other jobs (National Science Foundation, 2017). However, studies predict a significant talent gap in STEAM because students are losing interest at each level of education or failing to graduate from high school or college. The gap is even greater for low-income and minority students. AYC's STEAM focus exposes low-income, immigrant, and at-risk youth in K-8 to all of the possibilities in STEAM and encourages them from a young age, building a stronger foundation to their success in these areas.

really excited about that partnership.”

When asked about how businesses can help the school and become involved in supporting EMRAS, Dr. Kerr had this to say:

“I think the biggest piece is to be aware and tell people about our programs and to possibly think about us when they’re hiring because we have students that are proficient in office skills that are ready to go out to work and we have students in the medical field that are ready to work,” Dr. Kerr said. “In regard to how they can help us on a day-to-day basis...even so much as an internship opportunity for our students. We do have some with businesses in our area. The more [internships] that we have, the more the word gets out about the good work that our teachers and our students can do.”

Dr. Kerr stressed the importance of the school’s relationship with the Chamber, its business members, and the community as they are all partners in making the City of Rosemead successful.

“If your businesses need employees, you might check with us to see if we have students that are able to do that work. We want to be able to provide that service,” said Dr. Kerr.

Another way that businesses can be involved with EMRAS is to be part of the school’s yearly meeting with business owners and business leaders in the community. As Dr. Kerr explained, every year businesses meet and provide input on the school’s curriculum. This ensures that students are being trained and prepared appropriately to enter the workforce upon completion of their program.

Local business feedback on courses can also be done continuously throughout the school year.

“For instance we have an accounting program—we would invite accounting businesses to come in and meet with us periodically throughout the year and speak with our teachers to make sure that our students—when they finish—have the correct skills to work in those businesses,” Dr. Kerr said.

EMRAS receives funding from the state and the school strives to provide the most with the funds that they receive while also anticipating changes in the level of funding from year to year.

“Funding is always a challenge for adult schools, but we are so fortunate to have the tremendous support of our school board and our school district,” said Dr. Kerr. “They encourage us to grow our programs and to expand in any way that we possibly can to serve the community.”

Currently, EMRAS is focusing expansion and growth efforts on CTE classes.

“For instance, we really would like to start a phlebotomy program,” said Dr. Kerr. “We’ve been trying to get that together and one of the challenges for that is finding clinical sites where our students can do their phlebotomy rotation. Those kinds of challenges are the things that will slow us down, but that’s what we want to do—we want to start programs that will get our students more job opportunities when they go out to the workplace.”

As Dr. Kerr explained further, EMRAS will continue to grow and evolve as careers and the job market evolves. The school wishes to provide training for the jobs of the future and not simply continue to offer the same training and courses year after year. EMRAS is currently looking into training programs in logistics and robotics.

“We’ve added a lot of new programs in the four years that I’ve been here including our construction trades and our electrician program, and those are just joyful,” said Dr. Kerr. “It’s joyful to be able to offer those things to our community because these are immediate jobs—people can go out and immediately go to work in these areas.”

We have a lot of wonderful programs in our schools. Being able to look at what we’re offering to our community and seeing the success of our students—that’s a great reward. Even though we have struggles and we have challenges that we face, that’s the reward...the student’s success. I can tell you that when our teachers go out into the community, they see our students at work and that’s always our goal—to see our students be successful, supporting their families, and contributing to our community.”

New Ultra-Low Emission Heavy Duty Natural Gas Trucks Hit the Road in California

Food Express, Inc. takes delivery of the first set of 46 new trucks for use on delivery routes

LOS ANGELES, August 14, 2018 – Southern California Gas Co. (SoCalGas) and Food Express, Inc. (FXI) today announced the addition of 11 new ultra-low emission natural gas trucks to the FXI fleet. The company, with the assistance of SoCalGas, applied for and received \$1.1 million in grant funding for the new trucks which started making deliveries today. The company has an additional 35 trucks on order. Funding was received from the Prop 1B program administered by the San Joaquin Valley Air Pollution Control District and the California Hybrid and Zero-Emission Truck and Bus Voucher Incentive Program (HVIP). The purchase of 46 new trucks represents about 50 percent of FXI’s California fleet. The company is on the wait list for an additional \$900,000 in Prop 1B grants from the San Diego Air Pollution Control District, which would be used to purchase another 9 trucks. Replacing 55 diesel trucks with new ultra-low emission natural gas trucks is the equivalent of taking more than 3,100 passenger cars off the road.


“As the owner of a local business that’s been in my family for four generations, it is important that our company be part of the clean air solution,” said Kevin Keeney, vice president of Arcadia, Calif.-based Food Express, Inc. “We’ve heard from many customers over the last few years about ways we can make our operation more environmentally-friendly. Our fleet travels about 7.5 million miles in California each year and the technological advancements of these new heavy-duty engines made our decision to switch to natural gas trucks an easy choice.”

“Over the last year, we’ve assisted SoCalGas customers with more than 400 applications for incentive funding to use for the trade in of existing diesel trucks for new natural gas ones,” said Yuri Freedman, senior director of business development for SoCalGas. “At a time when greenhouse gas emissions from the transportation sector are increasing, the move to clean technologies is vital if California is to achieve ambitious 2030 greenhouse gas emissions reduction goals and air quality goals. These new natural gas trucks represent the only solution commercially available and will have an immediate impact on air quality.”

The transportation sector is responsible for about 41 percent of California’s greenhouse gas emissions and more than 80 percent of the state’s NOx emissions. These new heavy-duty natural gas trucks cut smog-forming emissions by more than 90 percent compared to the cleanest heavy-duty diesel trucks on the road today. When these ultra-low emission natural gas trucks are fueled by renewable natural gas, greenhouse gas emissions are reduced by at least 80 percent. Already, close to 70 percent of natural gas fleets in California are fueled with renewable natural gas.

Results from a recent study conducted by the University of California, Riverside helps to understand one reason replacing these diesel trucks is so important. The study showed that NOx (smog-forming) emissions from diesel trucks are “actually much higher” than California Air Resources Board certification standards. The study cited poor performance of aftertreatment systems for diesel vehicles as the main reason. FXI replacing some of the oldest diesel trucks in its fleet with the ultra-low emission natural gas trucks will help achieve California’s clean air goals.




FXI transports flour and malt barley throughout California for use in products such as bread, ramen noodles, tortillas and craft beer.

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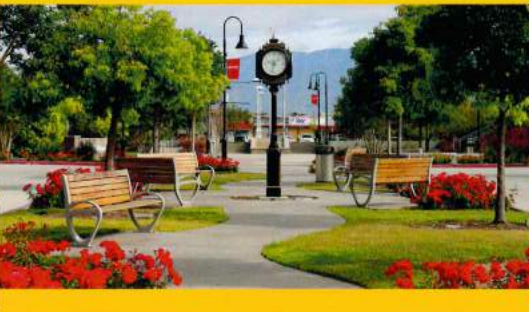

Los Angeles County Approves Funding To Support Cities With Homelessness Plans

Cities can provide insightful solutions on how to combat homelessness. The County of Los Angeles values each city’s distinct perspective, their unique challenges, and their wealth of resources. In response to the regional homelessness crisis, today the Board of Supervisors directed LA County to establish a process to disburse \$9 million of Measure H funding to 41 cities that aim to address local homelessness.

“Ensuring every woman, man, and child has a safe roof over their heads is a top priority. However, ending homelessness requires a collaborative effort, and we need regional thought leaders to come up with viable solutions,” said Supervisor Solis. “With today’s vote, the County of Los Angeles reiterates our willingness to partner with local governments to help families who need our assistance. We must leverage all of our resources if we expect to effectively solve our regional homelessness crisis.”

Today’s vote directs \$9 million of Measure H funding to support the implementation of the Cities’ Homelessness Plans for an 18-month contract period. Of the 41 cities set to receive Measure H funding, a total of 39 have crafted their own distinct plans on how they plan to address their local homelessness problems, and the cities of Duarte and Irwindale have submitted a joint plan. Further, the Board requests that the Los Angeles Homeless Services Authority sets aside \$3 million of State Homeless Emergency Aid Program funds to support the Cities’ Homelessness Plans. The additional State funds will enhance collaborative efforts between regional cities and the County as they help individuals who are at-risk of homelessness.

“Thank you to the Board of Supervisors for your support of the city homeless planning process which resulted in Homelessness Plans being drafted and approved by over 41 cities,” said Joe Lyons, Councilmember for the City of Claremont. “Today’s staff-recommended action to approve

a total of \$12 million for the city plan implementation provides a level of support sufficient to commence that process. My hope is that by approving today’s funding for city homelessness plan implementation, we are commencing the formation of the partnership so essential to the success of Measure H.”

“We know that magic solutions do not exist, but we can make a difference if we all roll up our sleeves, and come together to work creatively and collaboratively with the intent of helping our most vulnerable residents,” Solis added. “Homelessness is a complex crisis that touches all of us, and we have to think out of the box in identifying solutions.”

“Supervisor Solis is a powerful voice for those in greatest need. She spearheaded the effort to bring Measure H funds to local communities—with outstanding results,” said Jan Cicco, Regional Homelessness Coordinator for the San Gabriel Valley Council of Governments. “We are grateful for Supervisor Solis’ leadership in bringing taxpayer dollars back to local cities that have concrete plans to address homelessness in their respective areas.”

Supervisor Solis has been a County-wide leader in identifying nontraditional ways to combat homelessness. In addition to today’s action, Supervisor Solis previously authored a Board motion that allocated \$2.6 million for Councils of Government and homeless planning grants for cities who want to join the County in combatting homelessness. She has also extended the County’s Winter Shelter Program for the last three years to ensure that individuals and families experiencing homelessness have a safe and warm place to receive supportive services, eat a warm meal, and sleep. Supervisor Solis also helped establish and expand a successful mobile showers program so that homeless individuals can take showers, have access to bathroom facilities, and receive services such as health screenings, meals, and legal assistance.
