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Rosemead's Church, The Mission Community United Methodist Church

Pastor Deborah Oh is the senior pastor of Mission Community Methodist Church in Rosemead and has been with the church since 2009. Pastor Oh was appointed to her position and is an ordained elder of the United Methodist Church. The Rosemead Report recently had an opportunity to speak with Pastor Oh to discuss her work with the church and how the church is an integral part of our community.

"I received the call to become a pastor of a local church when I was very young, so this is where I find my life's fulfillment in preaching the gospel and serving the community—walking alongside the members on their spiritual journey."

Pastor Oh describes her church as 'missional,' the church being a vital part of the community—to improve the quality of life and add meaning to life for the people associated with the church.

One of the ways that the church reaches out to the community is through a monthly food bank event. Close to 600 people attend these monthly food distributions. The LA Food Bank, a separate non-profit organization, coordinates visits with the church and the church gives the food bank the facilities to set up and distribute food to the community. The church, through the help of donations from local donut shops, serves breakfast on the mornings of the food distribution.

"Volunteers are there as early as 5:30 a.m. to make batches of coffee for [attendees] so that they feel invited and welcome. We provide an air-conditioned space as most of them are 60 and older—and heating in the winter. We really feel that they need to feel like they have a place at our church," said Pastor Oh.

The food bank is every third Wednesday morning from 9 a.m.-11 a.m.

Because of the high attendance at the food bank events, the church has partnered with a number of local businesses who also attend including convalescent homes, the local CVS,

and other local pharmacies that help perform and administer blood pressure checks, flu shots, and medication consultations.

"It helps the businesses as well—whoever wants to come out—to let people know that they exist. It also benefits everybody here because it's information that's being passed on," said Pastor Oh.

During the open enrollment period for Covered California, the church is offering their space for people to sign-up and will continue to do so for several months.

Pastor Oh explained that one of the church's community programs came about because of the monthly food bank. It was the desire for many who attended to learn English. ESL classes have now been a regular part of the church for the past three years. With the acquisition of funding, the church was able to hire a staff to hold the classes. There is no fee to attend and is open to all. Classes are from 8 a.m.-10 a.m. every Saturday and Sunday.

"It has recently expanded to two classes," Pastor Oh said. "One class is for those who want to become citizens, so we now have a citizenship class, and the other is just conversational English. We have also partnered with Asian Americans Advancing Justice and they have an office in our location."

Services at the church are held in several languages to meet the needs of the community. Services are every Sunday with the main service in English at 10 a.m. At 1 p.m. the church holds a Vietnamese language worship service followed at 3 p.m. with a Cambodian worship service. Pastor Oh oversees all three services.

"We're just offering our worship services in different languages because that makes sense—that's who we are," said Pastor Oh.

The church also runs a full preschool which has been a part of the community for the past three years. As Pastor Oh explained, the preschool operates under the church's tax ID, so it is owned and operated by the church. There is

a cost associated with attending the preschool, but they do cater to families with low income. The program runs yearlong.

"Our biggest thing is we really want to look at the child holistically and not just their academics—which is really the significant focus especially particularly for Asian populations, but we also feel that it's important that they start receiving information and to see models of what it means to be a person of good character," Pastor Oh said. "So, character building is very important and that character building is taught on the foundation of the gospel—modeling on how it's described in the scriptures."

Pastor Oh said that they work in partnership with parents. The school staff makes an effort to understand what the parents are doing at home, what that environment is like, and the school provides a second home to their primary home. The pastor said that the kids are very happy and the school has a very low absenteeism.

The church also has a Vibrant Youth Program in which members reach out to the community and perform good deeds. One of the things that youth members do is to prepare and serve sandwiches to those in need.

"We get the entire congregation involved in making sandwiches and then the youth will take them out to local parks," said Pastor Oh. "Whittier Narrows has many cars parked there—people living in cars, so we deliver them there. In the afternoon, we take them to Home Depot to people that are standing in line...the day workers and provide food for them—and Rosemead Park."

Aside from regular programs and the outreach that they do on a regular basis, Pastor Oh wants to remind the community that the church is always there and is open to them.

"We are a place where people can come to be understood...A place where they can come to sit and rest... A place where they can come and find a friend," said Pastor Oh. "I think that is an integral part to anyone's life. We **CHURCH**, continue on page 3

Dem. Members Raise Concerns About Mistreatment of Immigrant Detainees at Adelanto Detention Center

Washington, DC — Today, Rep. Judy Chu (CA-27) and seven other members of Congress who all visited Adelanto Detention Center in August sent a letter to Department of Homeland Security Secretary Kirstjen Nielsen and Immigration and Customs Enforcement Acting Director Ronald Vitiello to express “deep concern about the treatment of immigration detainees at the Adelanto Detention Center.” The letter follows a September 27, 2018 report by the Office of Inspector General (OIG) at the Department of Homeland Security (DHS), which details horrific conditions at Adelanto, like bedsheets being tied like nooses in detainee rooms, inadequate medical treatment, and inappropriate segregation of detainees. The letter asks DHS to answer questions on employee training to identify risks of self-harm and suicide-prevention as well as an accounting of responses to immigrants who had nooses found in their rooms. Rep. Chu, who has visited Adelanto

on multiple occasions, released the following statement: “The OIG report out of Adelanto was horrifying. I had visited this facility multiple times, as both a Member of Congress and psychologist trained in trauma, to ask about the medical care provided. But it took an unannounced visit by an OIG to finally reveal the conditions they want to hide from the public, like bedsheets being used as nooses and staff who make light of those cries for help. The OIG also reported that ‘detainees do not have timely access to proper medical care.’ That is inexcusable. It’s clear immigrants are suffering from neglect and abuse at the hands of our own government, and we deserve answers.” The letter was cosigned by Reps. Zoe Lofgren (CA-19), Grace Napolitano (CA-32), Mark Takano (CA-41), Nanette Diaz Barragán (CA-44), Norma Torres (CA-35), Lucille Roybal-Allard (CA-40), and Jimmy Gomez (CA-34).

Need To Change Your Name On Your Social Security Card?

Are you changing your name? If so, let Social Security know so we can update your information, send you a corrected card, and make sure you get the benefits you’ve earned. To change your name on your card, you must show us documents proving your legal name change and identity. If you are a U.S. citizen, you also must show us a document proving your U.S. citizenship, if it is not already in our records. You must present original documents or copies certified by the agency that issued them. We can’t accept photocopies or notarized copies. To prove your legal name change, you must show one of the following documents: • Marriage document; • Divorce decree; • Certificate of naturalization showing a new name; or • Court order for a name change. To prove your identity, you must show an unexpired document showing your name, identifying information, and photograph, such as one of the following: • U.S. driver’s license; • State-issued non-driver’s identification card; or • U.S. passport. If you don’t have one of those documents available, we may be able to accept your:

• Employer identification card; • School identification card; • Health insurance card; or • U.S. military identification card. To prove your U.S. citizenship, you must show one of the following documents: • U.S. birth certificate; • U.S. Consular Report of Birth Abroad; • U.S. passport (unexpired); • Certificate of Naturalization; or • Certificate of Citizenship. Whatever your reason for your name change, Social Security is here to help you with the new... you! Fill out the form at www.socialsecurity.gov/forms/ss-5.pdf and follow the instructions to ensure your Social Security card is delivered in a timely manner. You can also locate your local field office at www.socialsecurity.gov/locator so you can apply for your updated card and show your required documents in person. For complete instructions, visit www.socialsecurity.gov/ssnumber, which includes information for non-citizens. And remember, if you simply need to replace a lost Social Security card, but don’t need to change your name, you can — in most states — request your replacement card online using your my Social Security account at www.socialsecurity.gov/myaccount

Message from the Interim Superintendent

Dear Rosemead Community and Friends,

Many exciting things are happening at Rosemead School District schools. One exciting thing we just completed was an application for a \$500,000 Title IV grant to provide all students with access to well-rounded education opportunities. As part of our DREAMS Project, we want to integrate enhancing visual and performing arts so we can advance our efforts in *Developing Rosemead Engineers, Artists, Mathematicians, and Scientists*. We will be waiting patiently for the award announcement to be made in about one month. In the meantime, our teachers, staff, parents and community are already on board to make this DREAMS Project a reality, even if we do not get this grant because we know that Science, Technology, Engineering and Math (STEM) learning is a critical component in today’s instructional practices, and in preparing our students for future academic and career success.

Current research also shows that fundamental visual and performing arts skills support all learners in their learning process. With comprehensive STEAM instruction, the “A” for Arts is at the heart of STEM teaching and learning. Rosemead School District has successfully established a model STEAM Lab at Encinita Elementary that serves as a clear blueprint for our plans to scale-up and introduce a STEAM Lab at all of our schools. At RSD, we believe it is our moral obligation to provide our students with an education that prepares them for their future careers, and current job reports indicate that STEM-related positions are in great demand and will continue to be so in the future; in addition, current college and career tracts emphasize the interrelation of these fields with art.

We are grateful for our corporate STEM partners from Aerospace Corporation and Northrop Grumman Corporation volunteer engineers and business partners from Panda Restaurants Group and the Rosemead Chamber of Commerce who donate their time and expertise to support our students and teachers.

We also want to thank Panda Cares, the philanthropic arm of the Panda Restaurants Group, for always sending volunteers to help our district each year. They have done beautification projects at each of our schools and most recently the corporate executive restaurant building team brought 80+ volunteers to help Encinita with landscaping the new CA Native Garden and putting up inspirational quotes in chain link fences. The volunteers were enthusiastic and worked so hard. We also want to thank Jesse Chang, founder of Catalyst San Gabriel Valley, a non-profit organization that has helped our district and San Gabriel, Alhambra and Garvey School Districts with their garden projects, for helping Encinita with the garden design and working alongside Panda volunteers.



Our RSD Leader in Me/7 Habits student and staff leadership development framework continues to grow and our students are developing valuable lifelong habits of reaching their goals for success. CA Controller Reports State Revenue Outpacing Expectations for September and 2018-19 Fiscal Year

SACRAMENTO — State Controller Betty T. Yee today reported the state received \$12.10 billion in revenue in September, exceeding projections in the 2018-19 fiscal year budget by 5.1 percent, or \$582.4 million.

This month, all of the “big three” revenue sources — personal income tax (PIT), corporation tax, and sales tax — came in higher than assumed in the enacted budget.

For the first quarter of the 2018-19 fiscal year, revenues of \$28.71 billion are 5.2 percent (\$1.43 billion) higher than projected in the budget enacted at the end of June. Total revenues for FY 2018-19 thus far are 10.8 percent (\$2.79 billion) higher than for the first quarter of FY 2017-18.

For September, PIT receipts of \$8.44 billion were 3.7 percent (\$297.4 million) more than expected in the FY 2018-19 Budget Act.

September corporation taxes of \$1.30 billion were 11.2 percent (\$130.9 million) above FY 2018-19 Budget Act estimates.

Sales tax receipts of \$2.00 billion for September were 10.6 percent (\$191.9 million) more than anticipated in the FY 2018-19 budget.

Los Angeles County to Combat and Provide Alternatives to High-Cost Loans

LOS ANGELES, CA – Recent research by the California Department of Business Oversight found that more than 60% of California payday loan storefronts are concentrated in areas with family poverty rates higher than the state average. Following a December 2017 motion by Supervisor Hilda L. Solis that directed County Departments to examine the impact of high-cost loans, today the Board of Supervisors passed a motion, authored by Supervisor Solis and co-authored by Supervisor Sheila Kuehl, to develop a comprehensive County response to combat high-cost loans and create affordable alternatives.

“While licensed high-cost loans are a legal industry, their products often trap our communities in an unrelenting cycle of debt,” said Supervisor Solis. “The County has a responsibility to protect consumers from predatory lenders. Today’s action ensures that borrowers retain access to affordable emergency loans, while protecting consumers from those who would prey on our most vulnerable low-income residents.”


Today’s motion directs County Departments to develop and scale high-cost loan alternatives (such as microloans or lending circles) with community-based organizations and financial institutions. LA County will begin a multi-year education campaign designed to alert and inform consumers about the risks of entering into high-cost loan agreements, and suggest available alternatives. This culturally-competent and multi-lingual education campaign will be targeted to neighborhoods where high-cost loan vendors are most prominent, with a special focus on reaching women and immigrant borrowers. The LA County Department of Regional Planning will also develop concrete strategies to control impacts caused by high-cost lenders and limit over-concentration of these businesses.

“It’s no secret that high cost loans are called ‘predatory’ because that’s exactly what they are and push low-income families deeper and deeper into debt,” said Supervisor Kuehl. “Families do, however, sometimes need a short-term loan to carry them through a crisis, and this motion takes the first step in creating some alternatives.”

The motion also directs the County Department of Consumer and Business Affairs to develop and implement a partnership plan with community-based organizations to launch a comprehensive outreach education campaign to increase the number of recipients of the Earned Income Tax Credit (EITC) in LA County.

According to the County’s report entitled “Curbing the Effects of High-Cost Loans in Los Angeles County,” high-cost loans exacerbate the financial strain faced by most borrowers and are concentrated in areas with above-average poverty rates. These high-cost loans have deeply negative consequences for LA County’s most vulnerable populations. The use of high-cost products such as payday loans is 63% higher for those earning less than \$40,000 annually than for those earning more; 82% higher for those with some college education or less than for those with a four-year degree or more; 103% higher for those who are separated or divorced than for those of all other marital statuses; and 105% higher for African Americans than for other races/ethnicities. Furthermore, communities near high-cost loan storefronts have a higher than average unemployment rate.

While some high-cost lenders advertise their loans as a quick fix for a financial emergency, the reality is that these loans often keep consumers in a debt cycle: the Consumer Financial Protection Bureau indicated that more than 80% of payday loans are either rolled over or followed by another loan. Further impacting their long-term financial health, 7 in 10 borrowers use high-cost loans for regular, recurring expenses such as rent and utilities, according to the PEW Charitable Trust.

Helping Veterans And Active Duty Military Members

Every year on Veterans Day, we honor the people who risk their lives to protect our freedom. Social Security honors veterans and active duty members of the military every day by giving them the respect they deserve. Social Security’s disability program is an important part of our obligation to wounded warriors and their families.

For military members who return home with injuries, Social Security is a resource they can turn to. If you know any wounded veterans, please let them know about Social Security’s Wounded Warriors website. You can find it at www.socialsecurity.gov/woundedwarriors.

The Wounded Warriors website answers many commonly asked questions, and shares other useful information about disability benefits, including how veterans can receive expedited processing of disability claims. Benefits available through Social Security are different than those from the Department of Veterans Affairs and require a separate application.

The expedited process is used for military service members who become disabled while on active military service on or after October 1, 2001, regardless of where the disability occurs.

Even active duty military who continue to receive pay while in a hospital or on medical leave should consider applying for disability benefits if they’re unable to work due to a disabling condition. Active duty status and receipt of military pay doesn’t necessarily prevent payment of Social Security disability benefits. Although a person can’t receive Social Security disability benefits while engaging in substantial work for pay or profit, receipt of military payments should never stop someone from applying for disability benefits from Social Security.

Social Security is proud to support veterans and active duty members of the military. Let these heroes know they can count on us when they need to take advantage of their earned benefits. Our webpages are easy to share on social media and by email.
